Having been made in God's image and likeness, we are to strive to be like Him in this world. But, we cannot do this unaided by grace! We need God's grace so as to fulfill this high calling! And God gives us this grace abundantly in Christ, most especially in the gift of the Holy Eucharist.

I am blessed to call you friends. You are among my most important collaborators in extending the mission of Christ in our Archdiocese. In your generosity you are bearing witness to the golden rule. You are moving toward entering the narrow gate that Christ has called us to enter. I am grateful to you, and grateful for you. Let us now ask for the divine assistance we need as we celebrate together the gift of the Holy Eucharist.
