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Christmas and the Emotions of a Child of Divorce

Christmas is a hard time of year for children of divorce. Many are splitting time between homes causing their schedules to be disrupted and many are losing their family traditions. What should you expect as you interact with one of these children in the context of your ministry?

If it is a child's first Christmas after the separation or divorce of their parents, you should be prepared for a variety of feelings to be exhibited. Depending on how recent the divorce was, the child may appear to be in shock, or the child may be confused, not sure what their feelings are.

If it has been some time, and the child has begun to process the divorce, you may find some anger feelings emerging in your classes. If the child feels safe with you, then don't be surprised if a lot of anger comes out. Some children will hold their anger in when they are around their parents. They don't want to upset their already stressed and/or angry parents. But, when they get to a safe place and if you have developed a relationship with them, then they will let it all out and express themselves.

With Christmas coming up, help a child in your church pinpoint what anger looks like, sounds like and feels. You will be doing them a big favor when you can help them before Christmas Day. Hopefully they will be ready and able to really enjoy the true meaning of Christmas.

For children who are not struggling with a family breakup, Christmas is an exciting time of the year. Christmas may be a time when they can stay up late, they don't have to go to school, there are visits with relatives (who often spoil them), not to mention presents and candy. As people who work with children from all backgrounds, we want them to find the true meaning of Christmas. Most of you will go overboard trying to relay the story of the baby Jesus and his humble birth with special lessons and activities. There will be special Christmas musicals; special holiday parties or celebrations.

We want ALL kids to come to church and enjoy the specialness of this time of year. If you are aware of what is happening in the life of a child of divorce, you are better equipped to make it a special time for him or her as well.



Keeping Children Safe during the Holidays

The holiday season is a joyful time of year, but it's also a time of year when you need to be extra-cautious when out and about with your child. Between frenzied trips to the mall for holiday shopping, crowded airports, and holiday parties, it can be hard to keep track of your little one in the crowds. Safely Ever After, Inc., has provided a list of holiday tips to help keep track of your little one in the crowds.

1. Talk to your kids before a family outing. Make a rule that you must always be able to see them & they must always be able to see you.
2. Use the "two giant steps" rule—your kids can never be more than two giant steps away from you. Turn it into a fun game!
3. Teach your kids that if they ever become separated from you, they should look for a "safe stranger" for help. Maybe another Mom with children of her own, a person

at a cash register. Designate a meeting place for older children.

4. Tell your child never to leave the mall or store to go looking for you, no matter what anyone tells them. Remind your child that you would never leave until you are reunited.
5. Dress your child in brightly colored clothes to make him easy to spot. Be sure to remember what they are wearing.
6. Establish the "check first" rule with older children. They must always check with you before going anywhere in a public place, even the restroom.
7. Don't treat public facilities as a "convenient babysitter." Do not leave your children alone at video arcades, movie theaters, play areas, or other public places. Predators are known to look for unsupervised kids.

8. Always bring young children into the restroom with you. Look for well-lit restrooms in high traffic areas, or Family restrooms where everyone can enter together at the same time.

9. Statistically, the men's room isn't the safest place for a child to use alone. If you feel comfortable letting your older child, at least 9 years old and older, use the men's room alone, stand outside the door and call in as your child enters, "I'm right out here if you need me." It's a clear signal that there is a parent close by.

10. Discuss age-appropriate safety issues with your child in a calm, non-fearful manner. Replace the word "strangers" with "tricky people".

11. Make sure that your child knows both your cellphone number and, if there is one, your home phone number.



THE DIRECTOR'S CUT

This has been an amazing and busy year. It took us a while but we have finally settled into our new location. There were a few rough months in the beginning, however, we have finally got everything in working order. In 2018, we saw the growth of our training program through Virtus. As of now, over 20 thousand people have been trained using Virtus. Those are great numbers. Through Virtus, clergy are being trained using Critical Conversations while employees and volunteers are being trained using Protecting God's Children.

As Virtus has taken the bulk of training, OVASE has been able to focus on pastoral services. We have been able to provide individual, family, and couples therapy to those in need. Please pass along our information to anyone you come across who need someone to talk to. We have a male and female available to provide services and all of our services are free.

This year also saw another scandal within the church. This one occurred in Pennsylvania, however, the effects were felt throughout the country. Within the Archdiocese, we saw the number of survivors of clergy abuse skyrocket. The Archdiocese announced that in January that we will be going public with every validated accusation.



As we look forward to 2019, we have a lot of ideas brewing. There will be changes to the training program and the new Sexual Misconduct Policy will be approved. We will keep you informed of all changes and updates as soon as they are ready. Thank you so much for all of your hard work and determination through this ministry.
